Dear Abel:

We're moving at a very rapid pace now on our Civil Justice Reform Act project.

We have devised a questionnaire which was mailed to 128 "frequent users" and 387 randomly selected attorneys who have pending cases in our District. This questionnaire was mailed on Friday, August 16. As of today, we have a total of 146 responses.

We will be sending out a reminder letter on Tuesday, September 3, 1991. Accompanying the questionnaire was a letter signed by the Chief Judge and personally addressed to each recipient such as the enclosed sample. We accomplished this via various offset procedures because I knew I couldn't get my Chief Judge to sit down and sign 500+ original letters. In any event, it worked out very well for us. I am also enclosing a report that we were asked to prepare by the CJRA committee defining the lengths of trials via individual categories for the reporting period June 30, 1990 through June 30, 1991.

Our next regularly scheduled Advisory Group meeting is September 27th, and I'll make sure that you receive copies of the minutes.

Dear Mr. Adelman:

Last fall, the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives enacted Public Law 101-650 (H.R. 5316) known as the "Judicial Improvements Act of 1990". Section 101 of the Act states that this title may be cited as the "Civil Justice Reform Act of 1990". The legislation was signed by President Bush and became effective December 1, 1990.

The Act was designed to address the issues of cost and delay reduction in civil litigation in the United States District Courts. The Act further required each Chief United States District Judge to appoint a volunteer Advisory Group. I did so on February 28, 1991.

The Advisory Group is a balance between practicing attorneys and other persons who represent major categories of litigants in our court. The charge of the Advisory Group is to review our case management practices and overall court operations and assist in the development of an expense and delay reduction plan for our district. The Advisory Group held its initial meeting in March 1991 and opted to become an "Early Implementation District", which means our Delay and Cost Reduction Plan must be in final form by December 31, 1991. To accomplish the Advisory Group's mission, we need your input.

Presently, there are over 1,300 practicing attorneys with cases pending in our court. You were randomly selected from this group to participate in a questionnaire developed by members of the Advisory Group. In order for the results to truly represent the thinking of the practicing bar of this court, I request you complete and return the attached questionnaire by Monday, September 9, 1991. The value of your personal response to this survey is critical to the Advisory Group's development of this Court's Delay and Cost Reduction Plan, which will be published and available at all Clerk's Offices. Although the questionnaire in itself is not confidential, the responses are. A return court envelope is enclosed, thereby ensuring you of complete confidentiality.
