 - 1:45 The Narrative Structure of Conflict Stories:

 Conflict stories concern not only partial truths about facts, events, people, and places, but deeper, metaphoric truths about the storyteller that point to the hidden meaning of the conflict, and reveal openings for resolution and transformation. This session will examine the hidden narrative structure

of conflict stories, and how mediators can read their hidden meanings, turn debate into dialogue, and create the basis for a third story that permits the parties to transcend the issues that produced the conflict. Participants will learn how to analyze the functions and component parts of conflict stories, recognize the differences between external, internal, and core stories, shift conversations from accusation to confession to request, interpret metaphors and meta-messages, masks and poses, and create transformational windows.
